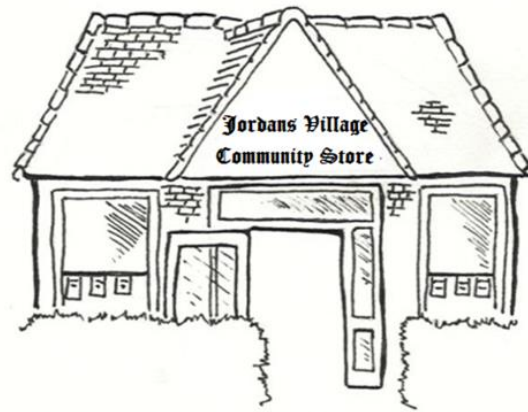

Fresh food from sustainable sources

Everyone should care about where their food comes from and how it is packaged, so we thought we'd explain a little about three types of staple foods we stock and where they're sourced from.

Bread - baked for us on site at local bakeries in Chalfont St Giles and Little Chalfont - yes even on Sundays!

Milk - a local dairy bringing milk down from a herd in Staffordshire. An excellent price for a dairy with a direct connection with a farmer.

Vegetables - brought from the market to us via Blackwells - now under new ownership with a very enthusiastic female owner at the helm. She prides herself on locating the freshest fruit and vegetables and not covering them in plastic! Yes more expensive than supermarkets, but well worth it.

The more you buy the more is brought in and this could easily happen on a daily basis.

DON'T PASS THE SHOP BY - go in and as a result feed yourself and your families with the freshest produce available.

Work at your local Store!

The shop is currently looking for any young people who are interested in getting trained up to work behind the counter, so that they cover staff holidays. You must be 18 or over.

Jordans Village Community Store, founded in 1922, is an independent community store, owned, operated and controlled by the Village. It is run by a combination of part-time staff and volunteers from the local community.

It started in a very small way in the front room of one of the early workers' cottages by the Village Green. In 1921, the brick building, now used as the Estate Office, was erected and a proper store opened.

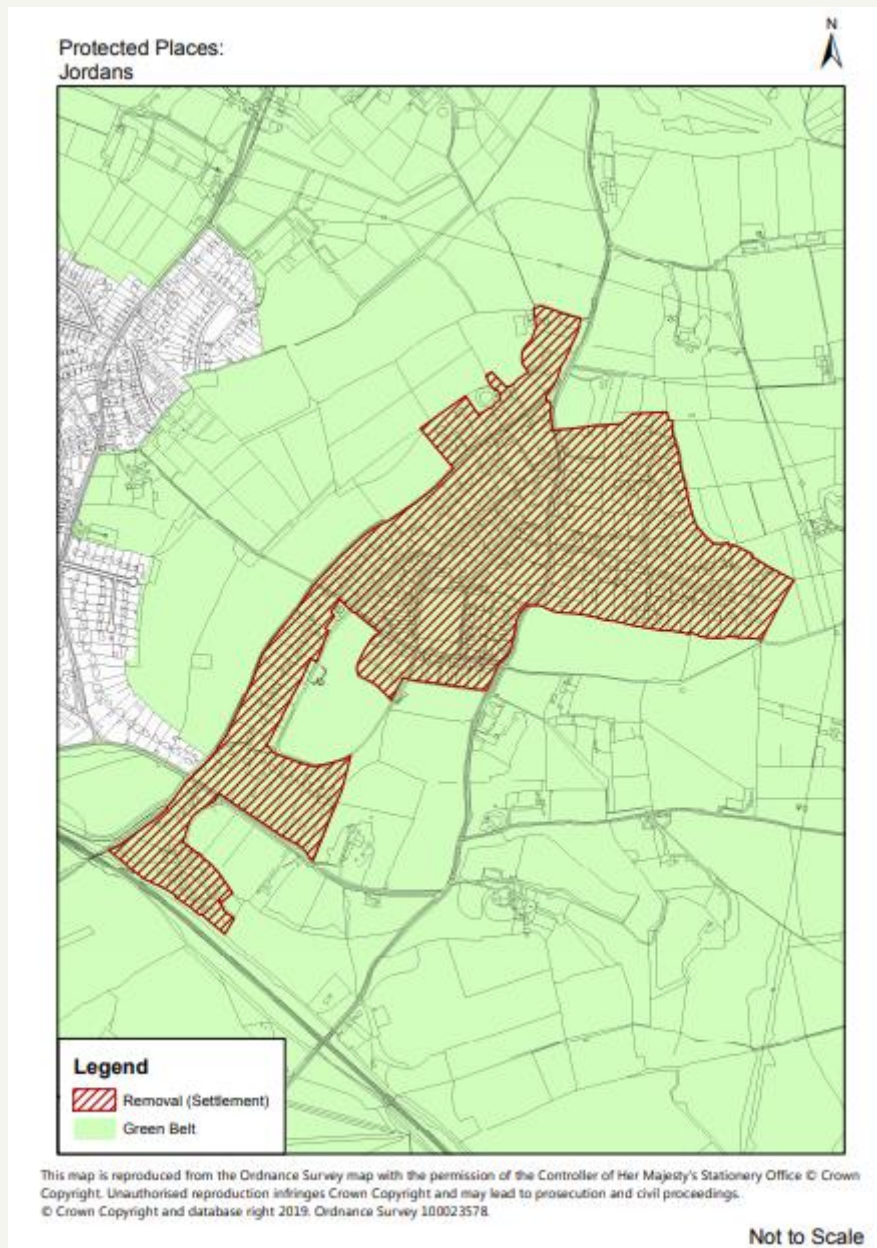
The store is now a general grocers, with green groceries, an off-licence, a sub post office and café. It caters for online orders, and home delivery. 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Save Our Green Belt

Jordans set to be removed from the Green Belt by Chiltern District Council

You may have seen the news published by The Beaconsfield Society and Beaconsfield Now which revealed plans by Chiltern and South Bucks District Council to remove tracts of land and whole villages from protected Green Belt designation, to enable the development of our countryside.

There is soon to be a referendum on the [Emerging Chiltern & South Bucks Local Plan](#), which incorporates the Neighbourhood Plans that many residents of Jordans and Chalfont St Giles put such a great deal of effort into in 2014.

Now it seems that our local councillors are considering whether to slip into this

referendum the removal from the Green Belt of our village, and many other areas on land in Buckinghamshire. This begs the question of how one might vote in favour of the Local Plan being adopted, if at the last moment one is to discover that such an objectionable piece of legislation is included.

Jordans is unlike many other villages, in that the philosophy behind it envisaged modest houses in large plots, with JVL retaining control over planning through its Management Scheme. The idea was to enable residents to maintain a kitchen garden and, while many properties have been enlarged somewhat over the past 100 years, the spacious green gaps between houses, the beautiful hedgerows, and protection of trees are characteristics of Jordans Village. This philosophy - as well as providing a wonderful environment for people to live - also provides homes for wildlife and clear paths for them through the countryside, maintaining the openness of the Green Belt even in a semi-rural village environment.

We strongly feel that planning to remove large areas of Buckinghamshire from Green Belt designation is highly objectionable; including this notion in the Emerging Local Plan at the last moment would just be completely wrong.

Furthermore, the map of Jordans published is incorrect and shows areas of Green Belt outside the GB4 and GB5 designations apparently being considered.

So how can you help us to stop this from happening?

Step 1 - Write to your local councillors and ask that they do not allow this late addition to the Local Plan and do not support the removal of Jordans Village from the Green Belt.

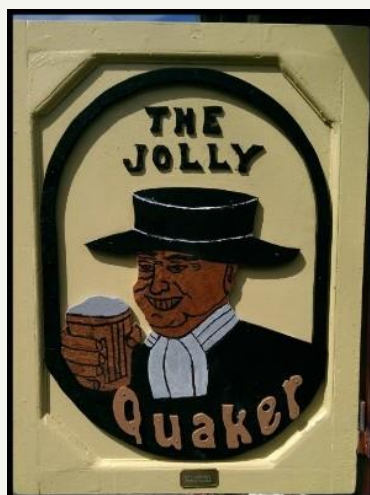

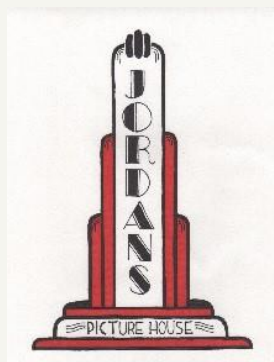
The Jolly Quaker

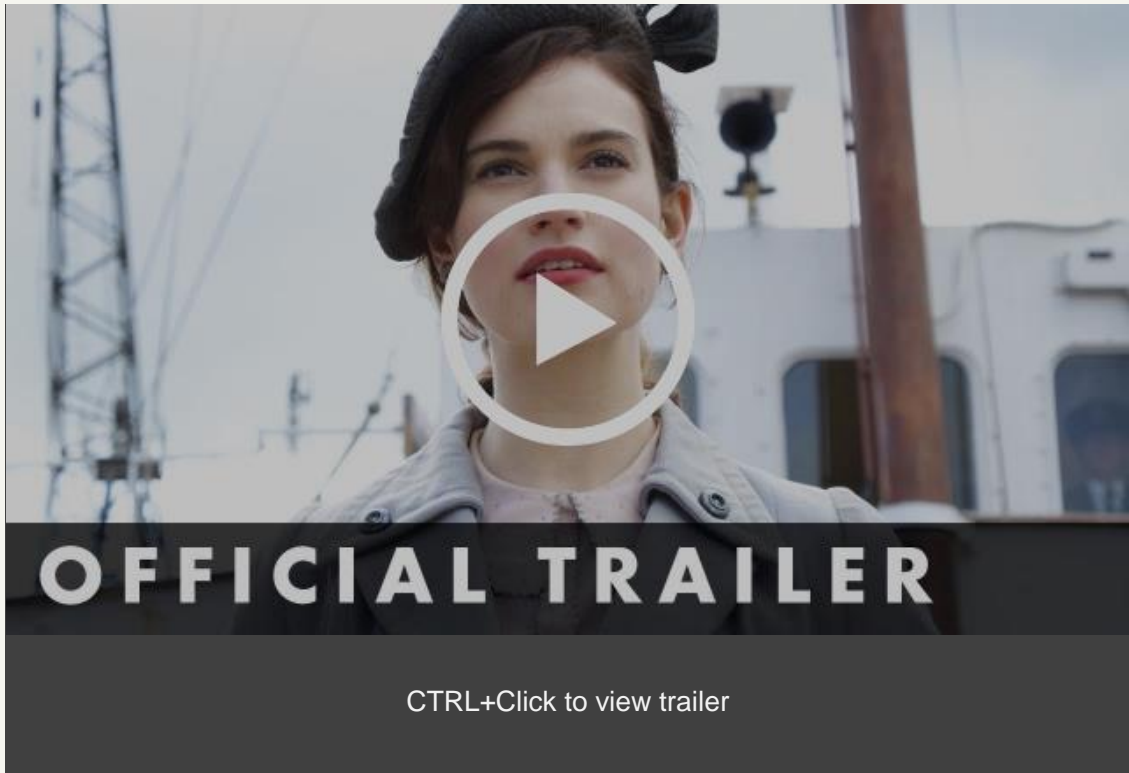

This was voted no.1 choice by our Members in the selection of this season’s films.

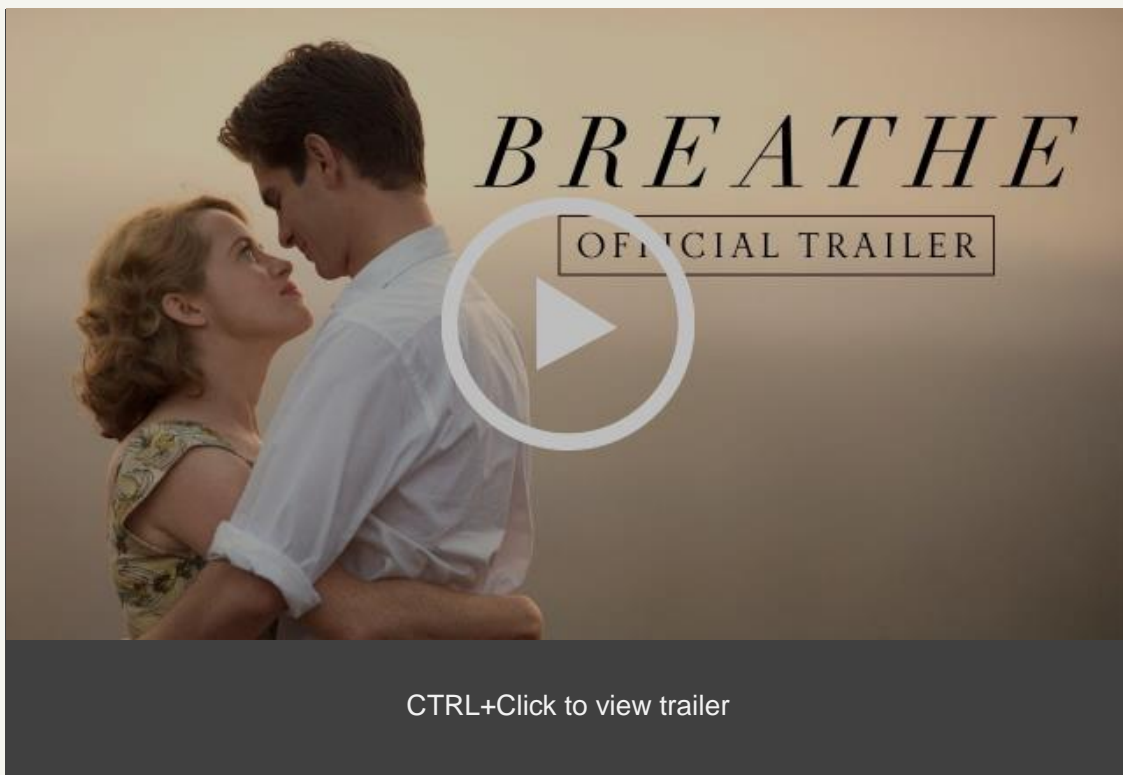

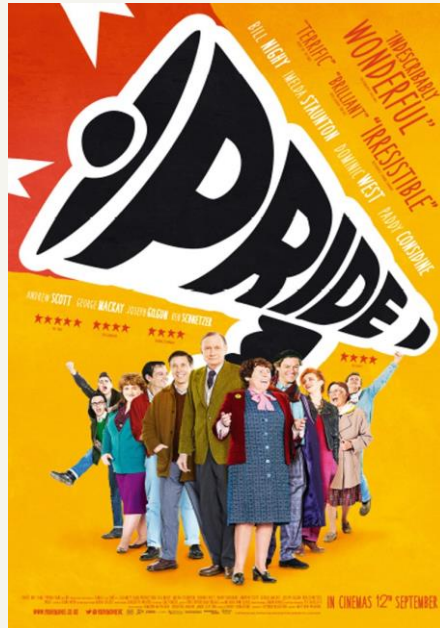
Pride (2014) 15

Paws for Thought

Taking your dog to the beach

Over the Easter holidays we took a short break in East Wittering, Sussex. The weather could not have been more glorious, and as a result of this the beaches at both East and West Wittering were exceptionally busy. But I was rather surprised at just how many people had their dogs with them. When sitting on West Wittering beach on Easter Sunday I could not help observing the dogs that were with their owners sitting in close proximity to us. It was a relatively hot day for the time of year and some dogs were being exposed to the elements for rather too long, with no shade being made available to them. However, most people were acting in a responsible manner and their dogs were having a fantastic time and obviously enjoying the beach environment.

So this month my trip to the coast has prompted me to write about taking your dog to the beach.

If you are planning on taking your dog to the beach firstly check that the beach you are going to visit is dog friendly. On West Wittering beach for example, you can only take your dog to certain zones between May and September. The rest of the year there are no restrictions. Secondly, try to find out in advance if your dog likes going to the beach. Not all dogs do and some are frightened of the sea. Thirdly, remember that not all dogs are natural swimmers. Once in the water all dogs will start 'dog paddling', but this doesn't mean that they like the water, can swim or stay afloat for any length of time, or would know how to swim back to the shore.

Dogs that are known to be good swimmers and enjoy being in the water are the medium to large sized breeds, with water resistant coats and webbing between their toes. Most retrievers, including the Labrador fall into this category. Dogs with 'water' in their breed name are also good swimmers, such as the Irish Water Spaniel and Portuguese Water Dog. Those that are not built for the water are the top heavy breeds. These have large deep chests and small hindquarters, such as Bulldogs and Boxers. Dogs with short legs do not

generally do well in the water either. Dogs with short muzzles such as the Pug, one of the Brachycephalic breeds, tend to tire easily in water.

The smaller breeds belonging to the Toy Dog group such as the Shih Tzu, Bichon Frise and Yorkshire Terrier, would really rather sunbathe than get their paws wet. However, many small dogs can be good swimmers, but they tend to get chilled easily and can be frightened by the water. But there can be the occasional exception to the rule with all these categories.

When taking your dog to the beach you should consider doing the following:

- Take plenty of water for your dog to drink, keeping it cool in hot weather.
- Provide it with a form of shelter (Amazon has a good selection of doggie tents).
- Take a coat, towel, or blanket to wrap around your dog if it gets wet and cold.
- Use a chemical free sunscreen if your dog has a short coat or has been shaven (apply to ear tips, nose and paws also).
- Beware of hot sand. Carry your dog to the cooler wet sand to protect its paws or provide it with some paw protection such as boots.
- Steer clear of choppy water and large waves.
- Take a life jacket/flotation device if your dog is not a strong swimmer.
- Don't let your dog out of your sight and be mindful of other dogs off the lead.
- Keep your dog on a long lead when necessary.
- Take something to entertain your dog with such as a ball or Frisbee.
- Do not throw stones for your dog as they can accidentally swallow them.
- Pick up your poop and bin it.

When back from the beach wash your dog using a gentle dog shampoo and rinse two or even three times. (If a dogs hair gets embedded with sand it can irritate and scratch skin and cause rashes and hot spots).

I hope you found this helpful.
