
UNVEILING NEXT SEASON'S FILMS

Refreshments will be on sale at The Baptist Church, Seer Green – join us for tea, coffee and homemade cake. All proceeds will go to One Can Trust.


No Mow May

Once again, we are supporting Plantlife's No Mow May annual campaign to not mow our lawns in May to benefit wildlife. The UK has lost nearly 97% of flower rich meadows since the 1970s and with them the vital food, habitats and nurseries of pollinators like bees and butterflies, have disappeared. Four fifths of the UK's butterfly species have declined either in numbers or geographical spread, or both, since the late 1970s.

How can we garden in a more wildlife friendly way? Mow all or part of your lawn once before May to cut back the grasses that are growing long now and which out compete other plants in your lawn (although if you are lucky enough to have Spring flowers in your lawn, mow around those). Then leave it for a month and smaller plants will have a chance to flower providing food and habitats to ensure more pollinators will survive this

WILDLIFE MONITORING

We will continue to monitor the butterflies, plants and birds on Manor Farm Field North over the next few months so that we can understand changes to biodiversity on the field over time. We are looking to build a small team of people to help us to do this - you might like to just be involved in plant monitoring for example, or all three.

What it involves:

- Butterfly monitoring we will be visiting the field once a month April to September, which will take about an hour and always in fine weather;
- *Plant monitoring* monthly from May to July which will take about 1.5 hours each time;
- Bird monitoring two outings between April and August to look and listen for birds.

We will be using the scientific survey methods of the national monitoring schemes to build our own datasets as well as contribute to the national surveys.

Young Archaeologists' Club (YAC) investing in our future 25th Anniversary Celebration

Since 1972 the Council for British Archaeology has run the YAC network across the UK, the only club for 8-16 year olds to engage with archaeology and heritage. There are 70+ clubs run by over 500 volunteers and the Chiltern Branch has always met locally and sine the pandemic we meet here in Jordans Village Hall. We celebrated our 25th Anniversary in March, a significant achievement as not many YAC Branches thrive for so long!



What do we do? We look at past world cultures and investigate local heritage including, when possible, participation in local community excavations. We always

have a practical, experimental archaeological or craft activity during our monthly meetings.

To mark our special event, Will Attard, an archaeologist with Thames Valley Archaeological Services, came to share his expertise of the Mesolithic and flint with us. He brought slate pieces and flint flake tools for our members to create their own







Following this, we were joined by families, former YAC Leaders and alumni, and representatives from the local archaeological and heritage groups. About 70 people enjoyed a buffet lunch whilst we watched a short presentation of the highlights of the past 25 years.

The event made for a very enjoyable and successful celebration. This was our opportunity to say thank you to some of the people and organisations who have contributed to helping us develop the next generation of archaeologists and historians! Paws for Thought

In an article published in the Saturday Telegraph, March 30th, 2024, the journalist Kate Spicer, author of LOST DOG, writes about how dogs can help humans. Spicer claims that one can get a hit of what she calls 'Vitamin Dog' from any breed of dog, whether passive or highly strung. For example, an associate of Spicer, Sarah Carey lost her 16-year-old dog at the same time as giving up her career to look after her mother. This resulted in Carey having a nervous breakdown. However, after adopting a troubled Podencos that gave her a project to work on, she found that both her mental and physical health improved. Not only did walking her dog make her fitter, but she also made new friends in her rural community.


Spicer believes that dogs are good for one's health. She explains that she never needed to turn to the studies that have theorised about the multiple ways in which dogs are good for us, saying that she just 'feels' it. Spicer claims that science is finally catching up with what humans have intuitively known for thousands of years about dogs being beneficial to one's health. Dogs she claims, help us find time for the activities that are good for us both physically and mentally, such as walking, that gives one increased exposure to sun light and improves one's strength and stamina. Dog walking is also the perfect antidote to the increasingly screen based modern life that can become all-consuming.

Spicer quotes Tom Woods, an assistant Professor in neuroscience who claims that dogs make long term positive changes to our health and lifestyle, and even have a positive impact on our creativity. Research also shows positive associations with dogs make people suffer less from loneliness and depression. But as Woods suggests, one should never think of a dog as something we can leverage for our own personal gain, and rightly points out that dogs are a responsibility, and for some people it's worth it, but for others it isn't.

Here in Jordans dog ownership seems to be on the increase, with many families taking on puppies. Having a dog can help children develop a sense of responsibility from walking and feeding them. Dogs are seen to be calming and nonjudgemental and a source of comfort to children as well as adults.

Karen Hubrecht a resident of Jordans, has recently taken on her third rescue dog. Bandi, who was originally from Hungry and was re homed with Karen only a month ago is settling into Jordans life. Having lost her two previous rescue dogs to cancer Karen had applied to the rescue centre to adopt another dog but had to wait for a suitable dog to become available. Karen found life without a dog lonely. Living on her own she needed companionship, and walking without a dog was just not the same. After only one month with Karen, Bandi is already becoming far less nervous and is

less anxious around other dogs, and Karen is really enjoying his company.



Finally, it has been requested that I mention that there have been increasing amounts of dog poo found on the village green, in Chalky Field and the woods. Some of these deposits come from visitors and there has been dog poo found by the tables on the green. For those that don't pick up, why not get a Pooper Scooper. They are available on Amazon and pet shops. So when out please make sure you carry bags and pick up as a sign of respect for our community.

Bill and Jackie Barrow were long-time residents of Jordans who lived at Yew Tree House. They were married for seventy years and leave behind Alison and Steve and three grandchildren Rachel, Robert and Josh.

Bill and Jackie are fondly remembered by us oldies. Bill is remembered for his directing Young Jordans Players with Anita Newton, his prize-winning vegetables at Garden Club events, but especially for his witty lyrics which he sang at memorable Suppers and Songs. So Bill packed up his kit bag and went down that Strand Where maybe your ear can hear a far-off faint band Playing perpetual requests for a sing-along song. Bill's song's sadly ended but his melody lingers on.
